



BUILD YOUR OWN POEM

- 1. Choose a Filipino dish or ingredient that inspires you or that you love!
- 2. If you are able to, cook it or order it, or if It doesn't need to be prepared, have it in front of you and take your time using your senses to observe it.
- 3. Ask yourself (or ask someone you are working with on this poem) the following questions:
 - a. What does it look like?
 - b. What does it smell like?
 - c. What flavors do you taste?
 - d. How does it feel when you chew/drink/consume it?
 - e. What ingredients are used?
 - f. How is it prepared?
- 4. Use the words on the next page as a starting point to create your own Filipino Food Poem. The possibilities for Filipino food go beyond what is listed and the combination of descriptive words are endless. I hope this helps you to jumpstart your piece of writing dedicated to Filipino cuisine.

SOME IDEAS FOR TYPES OF POEMS

FREE VERSE

Expressing words with no limitations on rhyme or rhythm.

HAIKU

- 5 syllables
- 7 syllables
- 5 syllables

ACROSTIC

The first letter of each line spells out a word.

CINQUAIN

- 1: One word Noun
- 2: Two words Adjectives
- 3: Three words Actions (ending in ing)
- 4: Four-word phrase/description
- 5: One word synonym for line 1

OR

- 1: 2 syllables
- 2: 4 syllables
- 3: 6 syllables
- 4: 8 syllables
- 5: 2 syllables


SHAPE POEM
